
Soap (opera)

Documentary


My favourite **documentary** is called Planet Earth

The news is usually followed by the **weather forecast**.






Series

Sensationalism

Sensationalistic language is a way that some media, like newspapers, TV news, or websites, use words and phrases that are dramatic, shocking, or exaggerated to make stories seem more exciting or important than they might really be. It's like when someone tells a story with lots of drama and exaggeration to make it more interesting.



Sensationalism



Examples in English

1. Headlines with dramatic words:

- 1. Sensationalistic: "shocking revelation shakes the nation!"
- 2. Neutral: "new information affects the country."

2. Emotional language:

- Sensationalistic: "heart-breaking tragedy strikes innocent victims!"
- 2. Neutral: "unfortunate event affects people."

3. Exaggeration:

- Sensationalistic: "the ultimate solution to all your problems!"
- 2. Neutral: "a possible solution to some issues."

Sensationalism

Examples in English

4. Hyperbole (extreme exaggeration):

- 1. Sensationalistic: "biggest scandal in history!"
- 2. Neutral: "significant scandal."

5. Fear-inducing language:

- 1. Sensationalistic: "terrifying new threat looms over the city!"
- 2. Neutral: "new concerns arise in the city."

6. Clickbait phrases:

- 1. Sensationalistic: "you won't believe what happened next!"
- 2. Neutral: "find out what happened next."


To go up

Last year the price of electricity went up.



To grow

The AI intelligence market has grown rapidly this year



Positive verbs of change



To rise

Inflation is the reason why prices of everything **are rising**.

Rise is an intransitive verb. It does not use an object.

To raise

The government **raised** the retirement age from 65 to 66 years old.

Raise is a transitive verb. It needs an object.





Very positive verbs

Alternatives

- To rocket
- To soar
- To surge
- To take off
- To shoot up

When the cryptocurrency market is bullish, prices can shoot up dramatically in a matter of hours.	Cuando el mercado de criptomonedas está alcista, los precios pueden dispararse drásticamente en cuestión de horas.
After the release of their new album, the band experienced a surge in popularity, with fans lining up for tickets to their concerts.	Tras el lanzamiento de su nuevo álbum, la banda experimentó un aumento de popularidad, con fans haciendo cola para conseguir entradas para sus conciertos.
The stock price of the tech company started to rocket after they announced record-breaking sales.	El precio de las acciones de la empresa tecnológica empezó a dispararse después de que anunciaran un récord de ventas.
The demand for electric cars continues to rise as more people become environmentally conscious.	La demanda de coches eléctricos sigue creciendo a medida que aumenta la conciencia ecológica.

to **level off**, indicating a period of stability in the market.

To remain stable

Despite economic challenges, the company's financial position remained stable.

To stay flat

The price of gold managed to stay flat for most of the year.

To reach a plateau

After years of rapid growth, the company's profits finally reached a plateau, and

further expansion became increasingly challenging.
