Employee: Sorry, my ass scent is very poor.









PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES TO MAKE YOUR PRONUNCIATION BETTER





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#1: Short words have short vowels

Vowel sounds are commonly divided into short and long vowel sounds. Short vowels almost always occur in short words such as: A: at (not ate), apps (not apes), cat, sand, man E: end, men (not main), pen (not pain), ken (not cane) 1: in, sin (not seen), fix, Tim (not team), sit (not seat) U: us, bus, fun, sun (not soon), shut (not shoot), of O: on (not own), top, not (not note), off EXEPTIONS: A: say, pay, day 1: kind, find O: do, don't







PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#2: Two vowels side-by-side generally make a long vowel Vowel sounds composed of two vowels next to each other are common in English. They usually have a long sound of the first vowel. Long A sound: plain, main, stain, Long E sound: meat, meet, need, read, cease Long I sound die, dial, diamond Long O sound: goat, boat, float, oar

EXCEPTIONS: steak, sweat, create, bound, bear, beard, pair, fair...





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#3: Keep vowels short before double consonants

The vowel that comes before double consonants is always in its short pronunciation

short A: mate vs. matter, late vs. latter, sadder short E: cheese vs chess, dress, mess, better short 1: dine vs dinner, wine vs winner, kite vs kitten short O: hotter, cotton, forgotten short U: butter, shutter, utter, summer EXCEPTIONS: none!





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#4: Pronounce double consonants as a single letter Words that have double 11, ss, ff, rr, pp, zz, dd and cc are all pronounced as if they are singular such as the words "fuzz," "occur," or "fluff." CC words as 'K': EXCEPTIONS: CC as 'KS' account, accuse, accent, success, accident, access, broccoli, impeccable, accelerate, accept, accessory,

eccentric, vaccine

occasion, occupy, tobacco





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#5: If only one 'E' is at the end of a word, it's silent Many learners will want to include the 'e' in their pronunciation, but it is actually silent and causes the vowel before it to become long such as

"ate," "bite," or "rope."

PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#6: Pronounce C like S when it's followed by I, E, or Y When followed by i, e, or y "c" is called a "soft c" as compared to a "hard c" (cat, close, cup) Examples include: Careful! C as 's' not 'th' CC words as 'K': cite, city city (sity) NOT thity century, center, cell center (senter) NOT thenter cycle, cyclical

certain (sertain) NOT thertain





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#7: Pronounce the word ending TION with a SH sound "ti" is pronounced like a 'sh' as in the word "shoe." The following vowels are usually a schwa. "tion" is typically pronounced more like "shun.", such as. EXCEPTIONS : 5 + tion = chun "tion" like "shun" :

action, Fraction, tradition, position, situation, ratio

- question, suggestion, digestion, exhaustion, congestion, combustion





PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#8: Pronounce the word ending TION with a SH sound When 's' is between two vowel sounds, it is pronounced like a 'z'... This gives

us words like:

EXCEPTIONS : S like 'sss' case, face, chase, race, the use

PRONUNCIATION IO TENDENCIES RULE#10: Always pronounce the 's'! Unless in one of the words with silent 's' already indicated, please

remember to pronounce ALL your 'S's.


