The Three Tricks When you don't understand

Repeat

Ask them to repeat:

"Could you repeat _____ please"

Rephrase

Ask if they can rephrase the question:

"Could you please rephrase _____?"

Restate

Check if you understood by repeating their question in an easier form.

"So, if I understand, you mean _____"

- Likewise!




Introducing yourself

Making a connection

- Wonderful! I'll text you and can set up something.





Introductions in a Meeting



Before Small Talk Meeting After

Speak to the receptionist. Meet the other attendants

Fill the time with light conversations.
Shake hands

Introduce yourself to anyone who may not know yet. Be careful with formality! Follow up and make sure to goodbye to everyone





Family Introductions

Take it seriously. It's like a job interview, but worse!

There should **never**, ever, **EVER** be any physical contact. Only a good handshake.

Don't joke with your future in-laws. Don't call them by their first names

Making Small talk

- "Did you watch the Oscars last week? I can't believe Leonardo DiCaprio finally won one!"
- "I love your shoes today; they really pull your outfit together." Compliments always work:
 They reduce social distance, remove tension and open someone up
- "I had such a hard time finding the location! It took me about 20 minutes to find the place.
 What time did you get here?"
- Referring to another participant at an event "I've seen that person at similar events before. I heard he/she is the director at Firm Y. Have you talked to him/her yet?"





Finishing politely

- Excuse me, I need to (find my friend/go to a meeting)
- Well, it's been lovely talking to you.
- Best of luck.
- Nice to meet you, Brian.
- I hate to run off, but I need to go.
- Let me give you my card before I go.
- Enjoy your time here!
