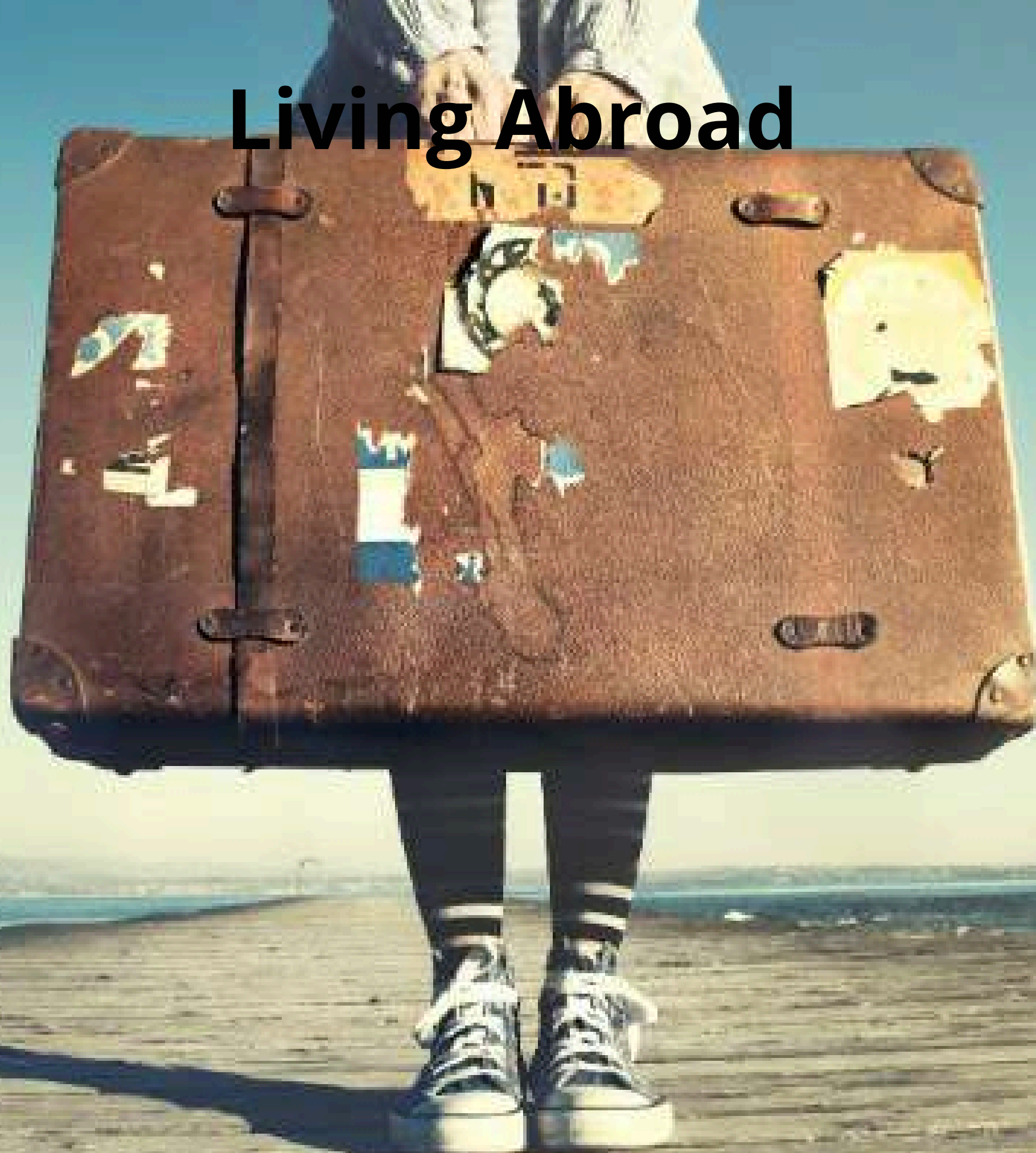

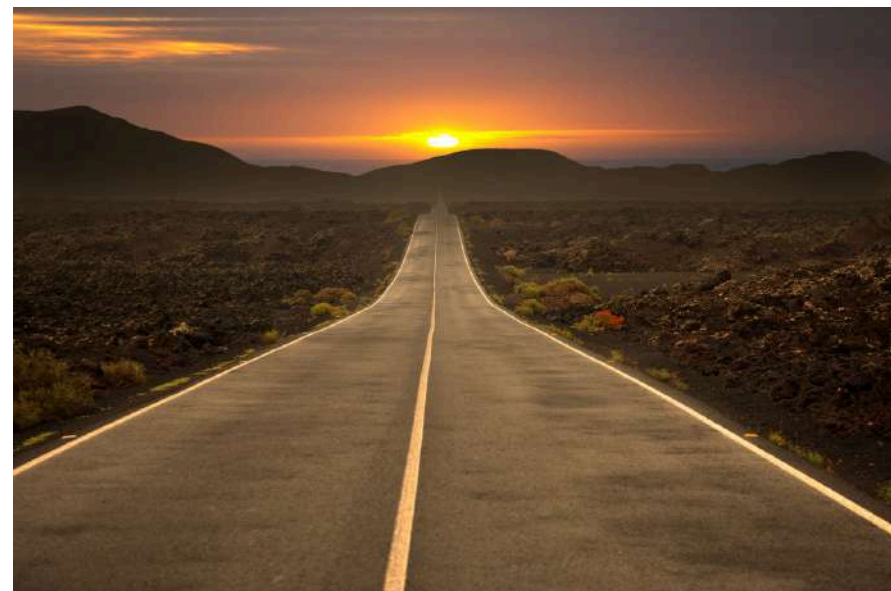

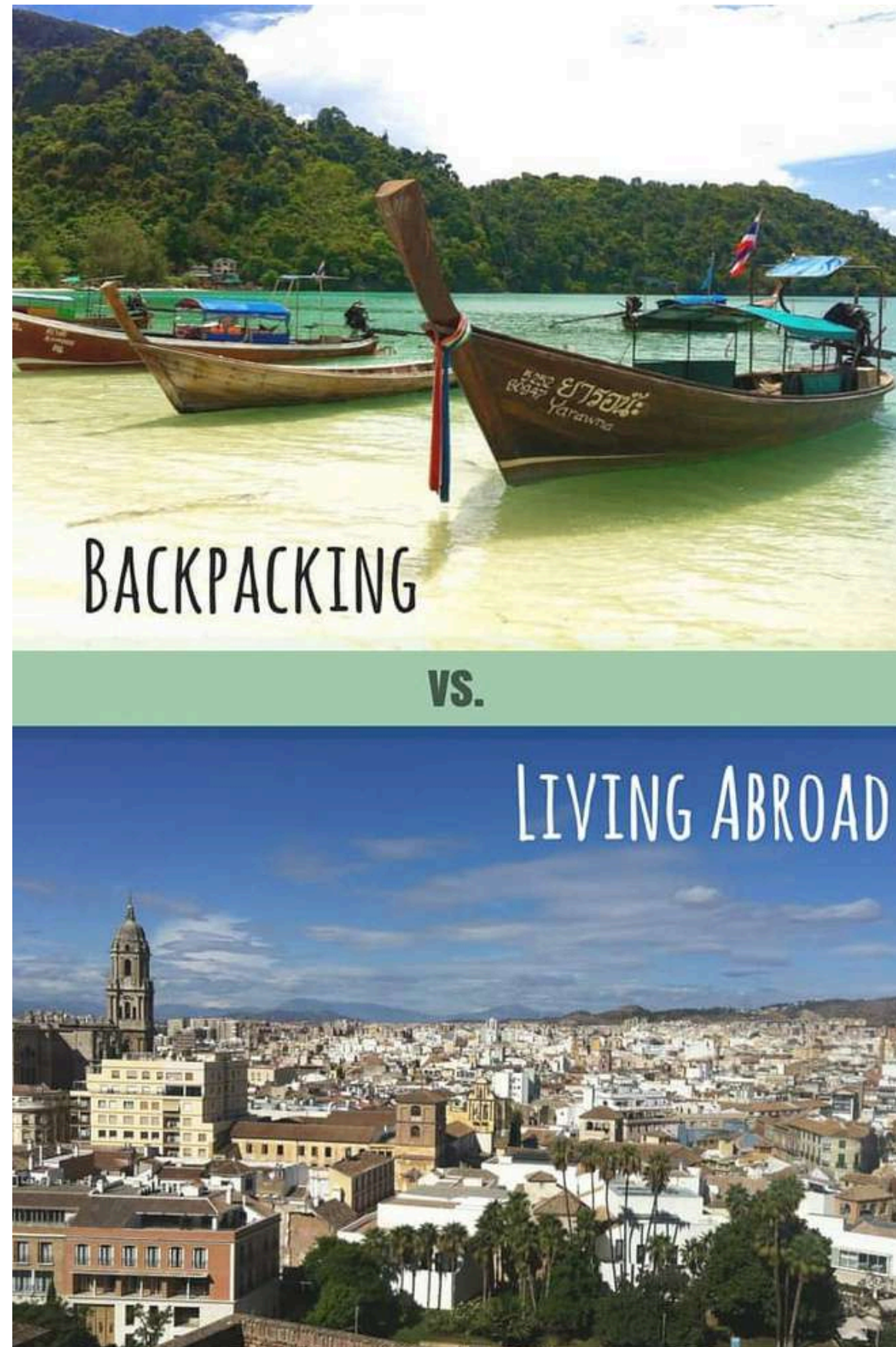

Disadvantages (Cons)

The language barrier- (one of the biggest challenges) It takes many years to master a language. It takes 600-700 hours for basic fluency in Spanish/Swedish/Portuguese/French. 900 for German, 1100 for Greek, Finnish, Thai. 2200 for Arabic, Mandarin, Japanese. How many for English?

Culture shock- It usually lasts 6-12 months). Culture shock is the feeling you get when adapting to the way of life in a new country. Local customs, laws and traditions may make you feel uneasy at first. They can be difficult to understand as an outsider, especially if they feel very different to the ones you are used to back home.

Making friends and building a community- It is easy to isolate and only spend time with other foreigners or people from your country. This means getting out and about, trying new things and being open to new opportunities.

Bureaucracy and paperwork- Not only will you need to make sure you have all essential documents from your home country, you will need to know local laws to understand how these documents translate into your new home country.

Homesickness - One study found that 51% of expats who experienced homesickness still struggled with it three years after emigrating.

Living Abroad

Disadvantages (Cons)

Access to healthcare- Medical treatment can be extremely expensive depending on where you move. And, as an expat, you may not be able to take advantage of state healthcare, meaning you will need to pay for treatment out of your own pocket.

The cost of moving and living abroad- Some sources estimate the cost of moving abroad to be between US\$1,000 and US\$10,000 depending on where you move, the size of your family and how much stuff you intend to bring.

Difficulty finding work - One of the first things you need to know when moving abroad is the visa laws in your new country. As a foreign worker, you will probably need to apply for a special type of working visa, or a new type of digital nomad visa.

Discrimination- Racism, xenophobia, homophobia, ageism, sexism and other forms of discrimination are unfortunately common to every country around the world. As an expat, you may experience one of the worst things about living abroad in the form of discrimination against yourself or your family.

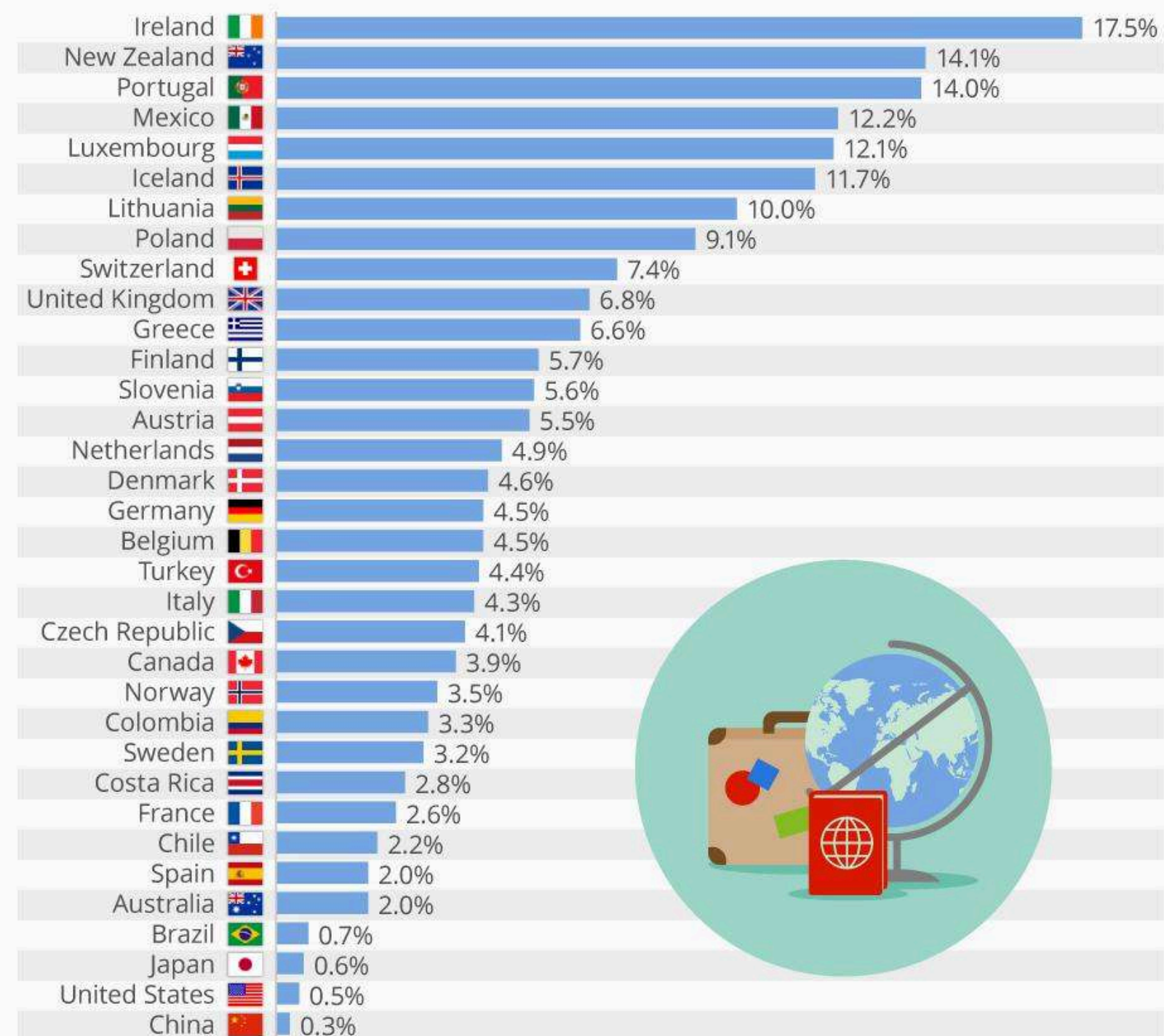

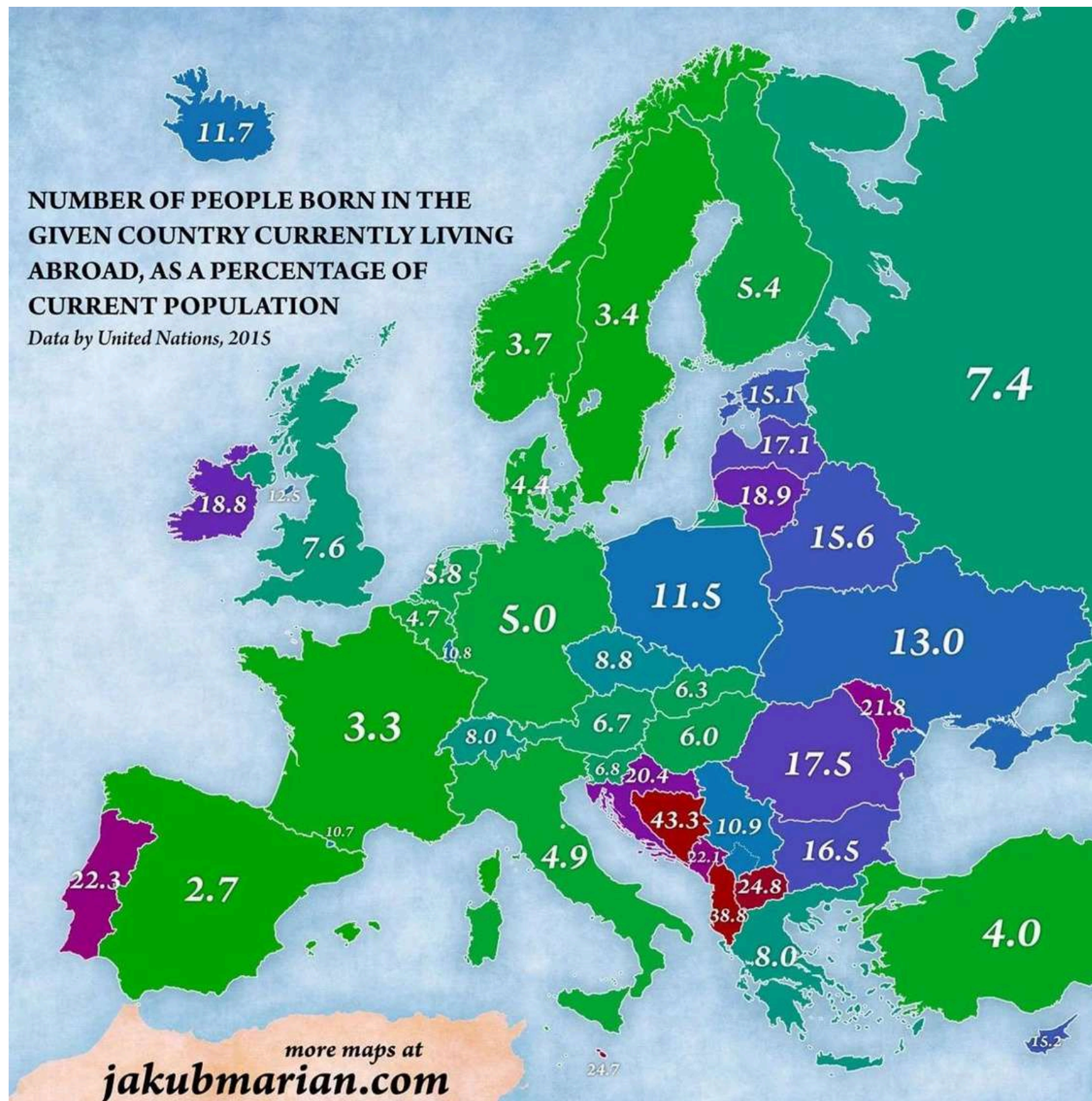

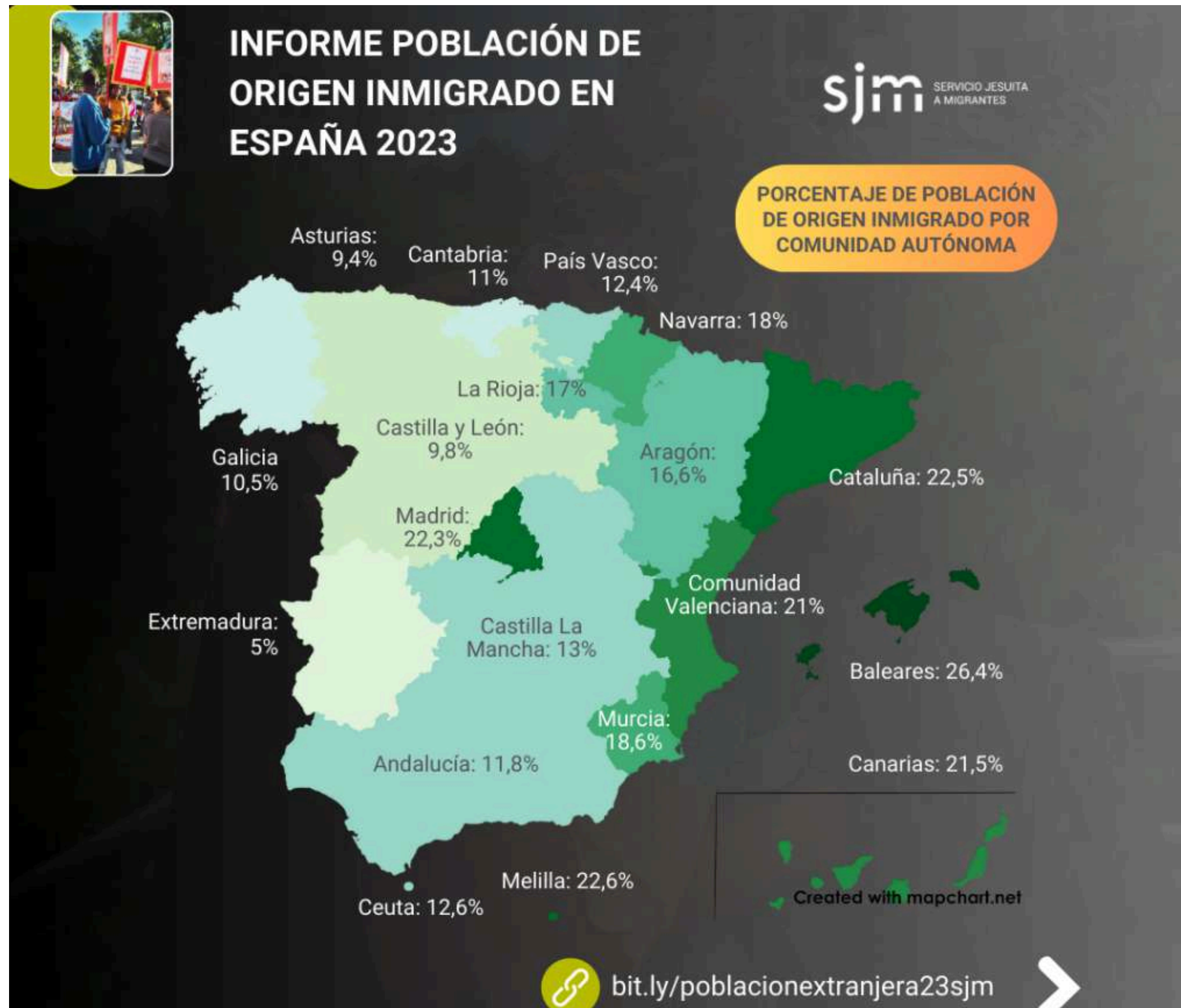

For situations that are **IMPOSSIBLE** or **IMPROBABLE** in the present or future



2nd Conditional

How many Conditionals are there?

Zero (ALWAYS):

When it rains, we stay home.

Cuando llueve, nos quedamos en casa.

1st (FUTURE):

If it rains, we will stay home.

Si llueve, nos quedaremos en casa.

2nd (PRESENT):

If it rained, we would stay home.

Si lloviera, nos quedaríamos en casa.

3rd (PAST):

If it had rained, we would have stayed home.

Si hubiera llovido, nos habiéramos quedado en casa.

Mixed (past-present)

If it had rained, we would be at home now.

Si hubiera llovido, estaríamos en casa ahora.

2nd Conditional

FORM

(If + PAST simple, ...would/would not + infinitive)

If I *had* more time, I *would exercise* more.

Si tuviera más tiempo, haría más ejercicio.

If they *didn't have* so many new people, they *wouldn't be* so delayed.

Si no tuvieran tanta gente nueva, no se retrasarían tanto.

If we *won* the lottery, we *would quit* our jobs and *travel* the world!

2nd Conditional

For situations that are **IMPOSSIBLE** or **IMPROBABLE** in the present or future

If I had more time, I would exercise more.
(I don't have more time)

Si tuviera más tiempo, haría más ejercicio.

If they didn't have so many new people, they wouldn't be so delayed.
(They have too many new people)

Si no tuvieran tanta gente nueva, no se retrasarían tanto.

If we won the lottery, we would quit our jobs and travel the world!
(it's not probably/likely that we will win the lottery)

¡Si ganáramos la lotería, dejaríamos nuestros trabajos y viajaríamos por el mundo!

2nd Conditional

Sometimes, we use **could** instead of **would**, for example:

If I **had more time, I could exercise more.**

Si tuviera más tiempo, podría hacer más ejercicio.

If they **didn't have so many new people, they could work faster.**

Si no tuvieran tanta gente nueva, podrían trabajar más rápido.

If we **won the lottery, we could quit our jobs and travel the world!**

¡Si ganáramos la lotería, podríamos dejar nuestros trabajos y viajar por el mundo!

2nd Conditional

Sometimes, we use the 2nd Conditional for polite requests:

If I you could help me, I would appreciate it alot.

Si pudiera ayudarme, se lo agradecería mucho.

If you could be here early, we would be able to get more done.

Si pudieras llegar temprano, podríamos hacer más cosas.



2nd Conditional

‘I would’ is commonly contracted as “I’d”



2nd Conditional

There are shortened versions of the 2nd conditional:



= why did you say that?
(I would say that if it
were true.)

(used to brainstorm)
